



Each **u3a** is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third Age Trust (TAT). There are thousands of independent u3as around the country. Being a member of an umbrella organisation brings many benefits. We have access to a wide range of learning support through subject advisors, online learning, summer schools and conventions combined with the benefit of a local organisation that responds to the wishes, needs and resources of the local community.

Interest Groups & Events

Interest groups are the life-blood of the u3a. Run by members for members, groups meet in people's houses or suitable venues to share learning. Groups are not necessarily run by experts, rather by enthusiasts – although there are some groups, like languages, where some knowledge is essential. Group administration can be shared.

Our Diary and News in Brief gives full details of the groups that we have and the events that are planned for the current month. Our website www.u3awight.uk is also a good place to look for news. New groups are forming all the time.

Some groups have a fairly fixed membership and some activities are run as one-off events, like Beach Walks, Garden Visits, Climate Crisis Talks and Walk & Lunch. The entire membership is invited to participate in each event and members receive regular emails reminders.

Benefits of Membership

Speaker Meetings

We hold monthly Speaker Meetings on the second Thursday of the month, during the winter, sometimes on Zoom.

Although we miss the tea & cake and the freedom to circulate and chat to new people, Zoom has had its advantages. We are planning a face-to-face meeting for September and October, although it is highly likely that Zoom is here to stay for some things. We have a technology group and one-to-one support to join Zoom if you are still finding the technical aspects daunting.

The subjects for our monthly Speaker Meetings vary – from understanding intelligence, to archaeological finds on the Isle of Wight and Symbolic Weaving. Speaker meetings are free to attend.

Groups are free to belong to, except where there is a small materials or venue charge; you can belong to as many groups as you like.

Monthly Newsletters

All members of the Isle of Wight **u3a** receive a monthly Diary and a bimonthly Newsletter with reports on group activities, future Speaker Meetings and Dates for your Diary.

Members also receive 5 issues of the Third Age Trust magazine Third Age Matters and can sign up to receive a monthly email newsletter from the Third Age Trust as well.

History

Our founders envisaged a collaborative approach with peers learning from each other. The **u3a** movement was to be self-funded, with members not working towards qualifications but learning purely for pleasure. There would be no distinction between the learners and the teachers – everyone could take a turn at being both if they wished.

From its beginnings in 1981, the movement grew very quickly and by the early 1990s a **u3a** was opening every fortnight. **u3a**s grew in Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland and in 2008 membership was increasing by 11% every year. 2010 saw our membership hitting the quarter million mark.

At the end of 2016 the **u3a** movement reached the milestone of 1,000 **u3a**s, celebrated by a conference with speakers including Eric Midwinter – one of the founders of the **u3a** movement. Today, our movement includes over 400,000 **u3a** members in more than 1,000 **u3a**s and is continuing to grow every day.

Ethos and Principles

The Principles of the u3a Movement

The **u3a** movement is non-religious and non-political and has three main principles:

Lifelong Learning

- Membership of a u3a is open to all people who are no longer in full time work.
- Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a **u3a**.

Self Help

- Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire: by the members, for the members.
- No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers: they are all u3a members.

The Mutual Aid Principle

- Each u3a is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the u3a movement.
- No payments are made to members for services rendered to any **u3a**.
- Each **u3a** is self-funded through its membership.
