Bookies' Favourites

Bookies' Favourites choice for over the Christmas period was 'Demon Copperhead' by Barbara Kingsolver.

This is a long and complex book which provoked a variety of opinions! We all agreed that it was very well researched but it was quite an uncomfortable read. Written in the vernacular of a small community in the Appalachian mountains, it dealt with the problems of extreme poverty and the effects of opioid taking on those who are having to live in awful circumstances.

The book was written as a parallel tale to David Copperfield by Charles Dickens. We all agreed that the dialogue style was hard reading and some felt the book was overlong, with too many unnecessary characters. By contrast, there were members of the group who thoroughly enjoyed it and were able to totally immerse themselves in the story.

However differently we felt about it, there was agreement that it was insightful, accomplished and totally believable.

Bookies' Favourites met to discuss their latest choice which was "The Thursday Murder Club" by Richard Osman. As we were reading it over the Christmas period, it was a lighter choice than some we had discussed previously.

It provoked a lively and sometimes vehement discussion. Views ranged from enjoying the different characters and gentle humour, as well as the twists and turns of the sometimes complicated plot, to contrasting views feeling that the book was shallow, type cast, condescending and unnecessarily convoluted.

Questions were raised as to whether it had been written as a money spinner for the author! Whilst some of the group enjoyed it as a light read, it certainly didn't get a whole hearted endorsement. It was the first book we have reviewed that evoked such a difference of opinions!




Random Reads


Non-Fiction Books

Entitled 'Depraved New World', the book is essentially a collection of Crace's sketches from October 2021 to June 2023, covering Covid, the war in Ukraine, two monarchs and the comings and goings of three prime ministers and their countless appointees. As individual sketches, they are entertaining, in a thoroughly partisan manner, but bound together they become monotonous.

So, for a complete change of diet, February's book is Mensun Bound's *The Ship Beneath the Ice: the discovery of Shackleton's Endurance,* the fascinating story of the expedition to locate the wreck deep beneath the Antarctic ice, written by its leader.

For those of you new to the Cycling Group, or would like to know more about our rides, the 'newbies' ride is to encourage those who have not been on their bikes for a while to give it a try again, or maybe want to get a bike and need some support to get them started.

Therefore these rides are fairly short and on traffic free cycle tracks, and usually end up at a café where we can have a drink and discuss any issues. My thanks to those who have tried it again in the past, and, of course, also to those more experienced riders who have come along to provide support and encouragement.

Our first ride of 2024 will be on familiar territory, starting at Merston in the cycle track free car park on Tuesday 5th March at 10.30am. We will be keeping to the cycle track which is level and safe, although the surface can be a bit rough in places. Speed is 'leisurely', there are no steep hills, and noone will be left behind – a more experienced rider will be 'tail-end Charlie' in case any problems arise.

I will ride the route beforehand so we are aware of any really bad stretches unfortunately, the winter rain and resulting floods have affected some parts of the cycle route network, and repairs are 'in progress'.

The second ride of the month will be for more confident riders, and will be on Tuesday 19th March starting at 10.30am. As yet I haven't finalised a route as I want to make sure any route is safe, but it will be on a mixture of cycle track and quiet roads, possibly with short stretches of busier roads, and will be a longer ride, typically 20 miles or so.

All are welcome on all rides of course, either for the whole ride or part of it, but I am

looking for suggestions as to possible routes, especially for the more adventurous rides. We can even discuss travelling to the mainland for a ride if anyone is interested and knows a good route!

As many bikes have been in storage during the last few months I would ask you **check your bikes over** to make sure all fittings and fixtures are secure and working properly, (including brakes, gears, saddles etc.), and batteries fully charged up if you have an electric bike – and you know how to control all that electric power! (Help is at hand if you need it, however!).

I do not recommend using a bike with very narrow tyres (i.e. 'racing' style bikes), or even 'commuter' bikes with small wheels as the cycle tracks can be bumpy in places so are correspondingly uncomfortable with such tyres – some of the roads aren't much better – but the choice is yours, of course, and you won't be turned away!

I recommend you have a **spare inner tube** for your tyre size with you, but there are plenty of willing hands to assist with any punctures etc. Whilst you are responsible for your own safety I also recommend a good cycle helmet and suitable clothing and shoes – no flip-flops please!

If there is someone who you would like us to contact in case of an emergency please carry their contact number with you in an accessible place - or give it to me to store on our Beacon system so that I will have it to hand on future rides.

These three conversation groups are all aimed at having fun while endeavouring to speak French. There is no teacher and we share the responsibility for supporting each other to improve, or at least not lose, what French we have.

French 1 intermediate group is held in a lovely room at Co-op Funeralcare in Lake on Fridays at 10 am. There are 10 group members and we generally have 6 to 8 present at each meeting. Some of us are more fluent than others, with one a fluent speaker who can correct our French. We start each meeting with each person relating their news since they were last present, then we have coffee - the Co-op have a kitchen next to the room which we use. The second half is a mixture of games, listening exercises and reading and translating French articles.

French 2 meets at Utilita's room in Newport on Friday 2pm with a tight-knit group of around 6 people, sometimes more. They will be happy to welcome new members. Meetings are very informal with no preparation and an unstructured conversation, so as to achieve as natural and loose a flow as possible, as in real life in France. French 3 meets at Utilita's room in Newport on Wednesday 2pm. We have 12 members with varying levels of French, although all members have greatly improved. One new welcomed member is French and able to correct. Each week one person volunteers to email members to prepare a chosen subject which usually becomes very nostalgic, interesting and humorous.


